A BRIEF HISTORY OF SANTA FE NUCLEAR WEAPONS RESOLUTIONS

Santa Fe has earned its reputation with a city and county resolution track record supporting Environmental Impact Statements at Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL), opposing pit production at LANL, acknowledging safety and cleanup violations, advocating for U.S. compliance with the Nuclear Nonproliferation Treaty, and challenging Trump's nuclear weapons agenda.

Here are examples:

- 1994: The Governing Body passed a resolution calling for a Site-Wide Environmental Impact Statement (SWEIS) at Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL).
- 2003: The Governing Body unanimously opposed the location of a Modern Pit Facility at LANL.
- 2006 and 2008: The Governing Body unanimously opposed expanded nuclear weapons activities, including plutonium pit production, at LANL.
- 2010: The City Governing Body and the Santa Fe County Council jointly and unanimously resolved to support "a new Environmental Impact Statement for LANL's Chemistry and Metallurgy Research Replacement Nuclear Facility" (Resolution 2010-221).
- 2017: The City Governing Body and the Santa Fe County Council resolved that the New Mexico Environment Department strengthen the revised LANL cleanup. Weeks later, the city passed another resolution "supporting restricting first use of nuclear weapons act of 2017 and in opposition to nuclear weapons agenda of current administration" (Resolution 2017-80).

2020: The City has an opportunity to continue its established legacy of upholding democratic decision-making processes while opposing a nuclear weapons complex which endangers residents, threatens environmental and public health, and commits the local economy to short-sided gains that ignore the long-term risks inherent in plutonium pit production activities.
